

Roosevelt's Darkest Journey: The River of Doubt presented by Adam Lindquist



After his humiliating election defeat in 1912, Theodore Roosevelt set his sights on the most punishing physical challenge he could find, the first descent of an unmapped, rapids-choked tributary of the Amazon. Together with his son, Kermit, and Brazil's most famous explorer, Cândido Mariano da Silva Rondon, Roosevelt accomplished a feat that many refused to believe. In the process, he changed the map of the western hemisphere forever. Along the way, Roosevelt and his men faced a daunting series of hardships that included losing their canoes and supplies to punishing whitewater rapids, starvation, an Indian attack, disease, drowning, and a murder within their own ranks. Three men died, and Roosevelt was brought to the brink of suicide. The River of Doubt is a story few know.

Adam Lindquist is a three-time national champion Roosevelt living history performer who travels the country bringing the 26th President to life. His performances capture the essence of who Roosevelt was and captivates audiences with its energy, message, and reminder of one of the greatest Presidents.

Understanding Minnesota's Changing Climate presented by **Dr. Kenneth Blumenfeld**



Minnesota's climate is famous for its ups, downs, and extremes, but is also experiencing changes unlike anything we have observed previously. This presentation breaks down observed trends in the regional climate to its essential points, emphasizing the rapid rate of winter warming, ongoing changes in the timing and intensity of precipitation, and how these changes differ from other parts of the continent and world. We will distinguish our long-term and/or significant climate trends from typical variability, and will describe how these two interconnected components of our climate can lead to unprecedented conditions. We will also discuss future climate scenarios, and the implications for actual conditions the region may experience.


Dr. Kenneth Blumenfeld is a climate scientist who grew up in Minnesota with a love for storms, blizzards, and being outside. He works for the Minnesota State Climatology Office (DNR), where he provides the state's agencies, communities, and citizens with up-to-date scientific information about Minnesota's changing and variable climate. Kenny is also an adjunct faculty member with the Department of Soil, Water, and Climate at the University of Minnesota. He enjoys talking to Minnesotans about their weather, and often does it long after the workday is done.

Break Point: Two MN Athletes and the Road to Title IX presented by Sheri & Peg Brenden

Sheri and Peg Brenden will discuss a precedent-setting court case and the battle for girls' high school sports. This course deals with the courtroom tactics, historical research, sports strategy, and personal reflections all contained within Break Point.

Peggy Brenden, a tennis player, was named a co-plaintiff, along with Toni St. Pierre, a Hopkins track and cross-country athlete in a 1972 lawsuit. The suit, which was filed against their high schools and the Minnesota State High School League, sought equal access to sports and contended that limiting the schools' sports teams to boys was a violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment. The ruling was a groundbreaking precedent that helped pave the way for the implementation of Title IX and opened the door to girls across the country who wanted to join their high school teams



Author Sheri Brenden is a former research librarian who worked for two of Minnesota's largest law firms and, as a reporter, for the St. Cloud Daily Times. She grew up in the midst of this pivotal moment and saw how it changed her high school experience. She asked her sister Peg if she could tell the story and her sister entrusted her with the now-fragile scrapbook she compiled of news articles, letters, and her light-hearted narrative "How to Play High School Tennis—An Instructional Manual." That would serve as a starting point for collecting multiple interviews from teammates, coaches, attorneys and a federal court judge. She also located key court records, organizational archives and newspaper coverage to weave together Break Point.

Twin Cities Ordnance Plant During World War II presented by Mark Haidet

Historian, Mark Haidet, will tell the story behind the building of The Twin Cities Ordnance Plant and its key role in helping the United States and its Allies win World War II. The rapid transformation of northwestern Ramsey County from farm fields in 1941 into an industrial complex employing more than 25,000 men and women during WWII was called a miracle.

Mark Haidet worked for the Minnesota Historical Society for 36 years, 10 years as a historian and 26 years in the Development Office. As Director of Development for the program's first 16 years, he built a comprehensive development program and led three major campaigns for the Minnesota History Center, Mill City Museum, and the Greatest Generation Project. He closed his career with three years at the State Fair Foundation where he completed the campaign to build the fair's new History and Heritage Center. Now retired, Mark is helping others as a historian and fund-raising consultant.

The Warren Commission Report: Fact or Fiction presented by David Yorks



This presentation will focus on the conclusions reached by the Warren Commission, a 10-month investigation regarding the assassination of President Kennedy, first published in September 1964, and that of the House of Representatives Select Committee published 12 years later. The House investigation was held over 31 months and was published in March, 1979. Mr. Yorks will identify several major issues that remain in question concerning November 22,1963, with the expressed intent to invite questions and comments from the audience.

David Yorks is a life-long resident of Lake Minnetonka and a graduate of the University of Minnesota with a History degree and a Masters Degree in American History, and a fifty-five-year interest in the presidency of John Kennedy. David has attended several national conferences and has met with and discussed the assassination with witnesses present in Dealey Plaza as well as discussing the assassination with several doctors who were present at Parkland Hospital, where they attempted to save the President's life. David's business career included being a buyer at Dayton's Department Store.

Growing Tastier Tomatoes presented by **Larry Cipolla**



In this timely course, you will learn how to select the best tomato varieties to grow, whether you are growing them in a traditional soil-based garden, on a deck or patio in containers, or hydroponically. Get tips on care and maintenance as well as the importance of botanical rotation to reduce insect and soil damage. Learn what varieties are more disease resistant and what diseases are "safe to eat" and what are not. Be a plant whisperer and see how the



leaves speak to you when they need fertilizer and what type you should apply.

Larry Cipolla is a Master Gardener and life-long learner. He frequently speaks to students and adults on a wide range of topics related to vegetables. His focus is on the integration of soil and hydroponic-gardening techniques for year-round gardening so that people can take more control of what they eat by growing their own. He has developed three unique Italian paste tomato varieties: Cipolla's Pride, Cipolla's Rose, and Cipolla's Colossus.

Life Lessons Learned Working at a Nursing Home presented by **Don Knutson**



As mature adults, we have had many life experiences that taught us valuable lessons. As a chaplain for 23 years at Ebenezer Care Center in Minneapolis, Don Knudson will share many "life lessons" garnered from the people he got to know and love. Some stories will make you laugh, and some may make you cry. You will be reminded of your own experiences and wonder what life still has to teach you. We're all in this together and we can learn at lot from each other. The Ebenezer Care Center on Portland Ave and 26th St. in South Minneapolis was closed in 2023 after 104 years providing a home for elders in need of care. Over 23 years of those 104 years, Don was privileged to serve the spiritual needs of an amazing community of elders.

Don Knudson was born in 1944 during WWII and the polio epidemic, which affected his health and life. He grew up in South Dakota on a family farm and was raised in the Swedish Augustana Lutheran faith. In 1970, he was


ordained and called to serve Lutheran congregations in North Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota. In midlife, he was diagnosed with major depression. This led to a change, and he received training to be a Professional Chaplain. Don served for over 23 years as the chaplain at Ebenezer Care Center, Minneapolis, MN. There, he supervised well over 100 students learning the skills of Pastoral Care. Gloria Swanson, his spouse of 24 years, served as Minister of Vital Aging at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church for over 16 years. Along with other church leaders of that time, Gloria was an advocate for creating this educational opportunity for seniors, the SALT program. Gloria passed away in 2021. Don has 2 daughters, 23 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren. He says he may hold the record as the Lutheran pastor with the most Roman Catholic descendants!

Fading Ads of the Twin Cities presented by Jay Grammond



Do you remember seeing those old painted ads on the sides of buildings for Coca-Cola, Grain Belt Beer, grocery stores, warehouses, etc.? Our speaker, Jay Grammond, has been drawn to fading ads, or "Ghost Signs" for quite some time. In the Summer of 2020, that interest became so much more when he signed a book deal to publish a book about the topic. Join Jay as he takes you on a virtual walk around the Twin Cities to view what you might call an "art gallery" that surrounds us. You will also learn a bit about the history of some of these companies that date back to the 1800s.



Jay Grammond is a professional photographer living

in East Central Minnesota. He signed a book deal in the summer of 2020 to

create a photography and history book about the fading ads ("Ghost Signs") in Minneapolis and St. Paul. Fading Ads are those old painted ads on the sides of brick buildings that once advertised a vibrant business but have faded to where only part of the sign is visible. Fun Fact about Jay: He once performed on stage at Carnegie Hall before a sold-out crowd!

The History of Jerusalem presented by Chad Wensink

Chad Wensink returns to present the History of Jerusalem, expanding on previous SALT programs, 'Reliability of the Bible' and 'The Biblical Importance of Water.' All are part of a larger curriculum called 'The History and Geography of the Ancient Near East.' This time, we will focus on an introductory overview of the history of the city of Jerusalem from the days of its Canaanite antiquity to the present. It will center primarily on the biblical history and importance of



the city and including multimedia resources to present biblically and historically important locations including: the temple mount, the palace of King Solomon, Bethesda, the temple institute, the upper room, the mount of olives, the garden of Gethsemane, the

site of the crucifixion of Jesus, and the empty tomb of Christ.



Chad Wensink holds a B.A. in Biblical and Theological Studies from the University of Northwestern St. Paul, a certificate from Jerusalem University college, and a Master of Divinity from Bethel Seminary in St. Paul. In fall of 2021, he presented two presentations on the history and reliability of the bible, and in spring of 2022 he presented on the biblical importance of water. He is the owner and founder of his own Christian educational company called Sacred Insights Education. His hobbies include teaching New Testament Greek, presenting on Biblical history, and going on vacations to Disney World with his wife, Helienna.

Runic Inscriptions in America and the Kensington Runestone in the Context of the Nearly 7000 Runestones Found in Europe presented by Loraine Jensen




You are probably aware that Alexandria, Minnesota, is known for the Kensington Runestone, but what are runes? What does runic writing teach us about our past? Join Loraine Jensen as she gives you an overview of the thousands of runestones existing today, primarily in Sweden, Norway, and Denmark; but there are some being researched in North America, notably the Kensington runestone in Minnesota. Loraine will also review examples of runes in pop culture.

Loraine Jensen is the founder of the American Association for Runic Studies, and currently serves as its president. While living in rural Minnesota, she was exposed to runes through the presence of the Kensington Runestone near her home town of Alexandria. As the Principal Consultant for Jensen Consulting, founded in 1995, she has assisted nonprofit organizations in grant writing, strategic planning and board development. One of her earliest clients was the Kensington

Runestone Park Foundation. She has developed extensive networks on runic research. Those relationships and her expertise as a professional educator in 2020 resulted in her selection for a prestigious Fulbright Specialist appointment to study runes in Sweden on a project titled "Viking Age Runic Studies: Education and Outreach."

Dementia: What Is Known and Unknown at this Point presented by **David Walcher**

Dementia is a term that covers a wide scope of conditions that impede the ability to remember, think, or make decisions that affect daily activities. It is not a part of normal aging. Dr. Walcher will answer questions you may have, such as: What is known and what is disinformation? At what age does dementia start? What can be done to prevent or delay it? What is the difference between





Dr. David Walcher graduated from the University of MN Medical School and completed residencies in Family Medicine

at HCMC and Internal Medicine at the Medical College of Toledo. He practiced in Minnesota from 1981-2020, including as a partner of Southdale Internal Medicine from 2001-2016. He is currently semi-retired and volunteers at St. Mary's Clinic and teaches at the Phillips Neighborhood Clinic.


Show Tunes – Classic Hits from Stage and Screen, 1930s-1960s presented by Mike Henry

He now has 7 different programs to choose from. Mike lives in Lakeville with his wife of 43 years, Jean. They have 4 children and 4 grandchildren who all live in the Twin Cities area.
