Breaking The Code presented by Chris Omodt



Chris Omodt, a seasoned police detective, brings us an unforgettable story of crime, loyalty, betrayal, and ultimately, redemption. He will discuss the book he and co-author, Pat Matter, wrote. Matter was the founder and 21-year former president of the *Minnesota Hells Angels*. Omodt will discuss the investigation into the *Hells Angels*, Matter's life and subsequent imprisonment, Matter's cooperation, and his time in federal witness protection. He will address many more things from the *Hells Angels'* war with the *Outlaws* to highly successful custom motorcycles. Since his release from prison and the release of the book in 2014, Omodt and Matter have provided training to several law enforcement agencies in Minnesota and also several other states throughout the U.S. on motorcycle gang investigations and motorcycle gangs fact vs fiction. This is a great story of redemption.

Chris Omodt is a veteran police detective who spent 32 Years in Law Enforcement, specializing in organized criminal investigations which included Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs. He retired from the Hennepin County Sheriff's Office in 2012, and is a former criminal justice college adjunct.

Omodt has an AA degree in Law Enforcement and a BS degree in Management. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy. He was most recently featured A&E Network's "Secrets of the Hells Angels," filmed in 2023 and aired in 2024. He is the co-author of the book "Breaking the Code, A True Story by a Hells Angel President and the Cop Who Pursued Him."

USS Johnston: Decoding the Second-Deepest Shipwreck in the World presented by **Ken Stano**



Missing for 75 years, the USS Johnston is the most iconic and unknown WWII shipwreck. She was a tiny tin can destroyer that fought like a battleship to stop the mighty Japanese Navy in 1944. In 2019, wreckage from a Fletcher-class destroyer was discovered four miles under the Pacific Ocean. Was it the USS Johnston? We will analyze the debris, compare it to preserved counterparts on the museum ship USS Kidd, and reveal how the heroic USS Johnston met its end.

Ken Stano, creator of the UTube channel History X, is a WWII historian, mechanical engineer, and pilot. He is producer and host of the video podcast Museum Ship Mafia. He loves digging into obscure details and secrets of WWII. These little-known WWII heroics fascinate him, and they will fascinate you as well.

The Lonely Road We're on with God is the story of a lifetime. The author and speaker spent 18 months reviewing his life and writing about it. The book is his witness and legacy for family, the church, and anyone interested in reading an autobiography of an 80-year-old Lutheran Pastor and Professional Chaplain. He tells stories that include life in North Carolina following MLK's assassination in 1968-69, the farm crisis hitting South Dakota in the 1980s, and indoor air pollution and chemical sensitivities affecting his family's health. Suffering from major depression, he faced his deepest losses and fears. This led him to become a professional chaplain. If, after you hear him speak and you want to get to know him better, you can buy his book, The Lonely Road We're on with God. You, too, may be on a lonely road in life. We're all in this together with God.

Don Knudson was born in 1944 during WWII and the polio epidemic, which affected his health and life. He grew up in South Dakota on a family farm and was raised in the Swedish Augustana Lutheran faith. In 1970, he was

ordained and called to serve Lutheran congregations in North Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota. In midlife, he was diagnosed with major depression. This led to a change, and he received training to be a Professional Chaplain. Don served for over 23 years as the chaplain at Ebenezer Care Center, Minneapolis, MN. There, he supervised well over 100 students learning the skills of Pastoral Care. He says he may hold the record as the Lutheran pastor with the most Roman Catholic descendants!

As the creative force behind JGrammond Photography, he leads photography workshops, speaks at cultural and historical events, sells fine art, and publishes books that preserve visual stories of the past. His work has been featured in galleries, healthcare spaces,

radio, TV, and podcast programs, and educational programs throughout the region. Jay is passionate about using photography to honor veterans, explore forgotten places, and inspire others to pursue meaningful personal projects, and to plant the idea with them that it is never too late to start something new.

Whitney McClusky began her study of African dance at The Djoniba Dance and Drum Center in New York with Master dancers from "Les Mervielles de Guinea" and "Les Ballets Africains".

How Religion Is Becoming Obsolete presented by Rev. Dr. Steve Thomason, PhD



Many people of the older generations (Boomers and Builders) wonder why their children and grandchildren don't attend church. Many often think they did something wrong in raising them. This course will take some of the guilt/pressure off of these concerned grandparents and demonstrate how massive cultural shifts have left the post-Boomer generations increasingly uninterested in organized religion. Dr. Thomason will review recent research by Christian Smith's book, *Why Religion Went Obsolete*, and bring it into conversation with his research on the church in the suburban context. theology is best expressed in his online ministry at artpastor.com where he seeks to explore spirituality and scripture through visual art and creativity. He and his wife, Lona, have been married since 1989 and live in Apple Valley, MN, with their four adult children and grand fur-babies.

Our Grandy (Duchy) Adventure presented by Ben Welter



Want to spend a few of your golden years abroad? You'll need a great companion, a good retirement income, and a healthy sense of adventure. When the pandemic travel restrictions eased in 2022, Ben and Mona Welter shed virtually all their belongings, sold their house in Richfield and moved to Luxembourg. For nearly two years, they immersed themselves in the life of the Grand Duchy. They hiked fields and forests, worked at a World War II museum and an English-language newspaper, bought venison and wild boar at Aldi, enjoyed warm Glühwein and hot Kniddelen at Christmas markets and learned a bit of French, German, and Luxembourgish along the way.

Ben Welter, a Minneapolis native and former copy chief at the Star Tribune, gained Luxembourg citizenship seven years ago, thanks to ancestral ties and a chance encounter at the back of a church in the Grand Duchy. Ben is a proud greatgrandson of Michael Welter, a Luxembourg farmer who was

born in Medernach in 1828. He immigrated to the United States in 1854 and settled on a farm in Chanhassen in the early 1860s. More than 150 years later, Ben and his wife, Mona, followed Michael's journey in reverse, moving to Luxembourg and renting an apartment in Ettelbruck, a small city not far from where Michael's family tilled the soil.

Bird Migration presented by **Stan Tekiela**

NASA's Space Grant Consortium — Launching Things Surprisingly Close to Space, from Minnesota! presented by Dr. James Flaten



This presentation will discuss NASA's MN Space Grant Consortium, which offers NASA-themed educational programming for college/ university students and faculty (and through them to MN communities). Particular attention will be paid to student-built things that fly, especially high-power rockets and "mock" spacecraft. We use weather balloons to carry the latter into the stratosphere (AKA "near-space"), which has many of the same properties and views as outer space. Stratospheric ballooning is the nearest thing to spaceflight that can be conducted in Minnesota.

Dr. James Flaten is the Associate Director of NASA's Minnesota Space Grant Consortium, a higher education program whose goals include promoting interest in space science and space exploration. Though housed in the Aerospace Engineering and Mechanics (AEM) Department, Prof. Flaten's academic background is actually in experimental physics; and he has also taught many physics, astronomy, and basic engineering classes in the past. He enjoys using ballooning (stratospheric free-ballooning and lighter-than-air RC airships), high-power rocketry, quadcopters, and robotics giving

students hands-on experience building and operating NASA/aerospace-related hardware.

Jonathan Nye graduated from Augsburg College in 1972 with a B.A. in Music Education. He is a retired music teacher, choir director, and

amateur actor, is a lifelong student of Scripture, endlessly fascinated by its formation and transmission. His bookshelf, a blend of Bibles and theological writings, reflects his curiosity, fueled by ancient texts and modern insights. The Klondike Kates are the mistresses of fun for the Saint Paul Winter Carnival. The Klondike Kate character is modeled after Kathleen Rockwell, an entertainer and businesswoman in the Klondike region during the Gold Rush of the late 1800s. Each year a new Klondike Kate is selected during the annual Klondike Kate Contest, which serves as the unofficial kick-off to the Winter Carnival. The newly-sashed Kate will make 350 to 400 appearances

during her reigning year. The Royal Order of Klondike Kates is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. Our volunteer members make appearances during the Winter Carnival and throughout the year at festivals, parades, shows, fundraisers, veterans events, senior living facilities, schools, and community organizations. Our performance style is best described as sweet and sassy.
